INTERVIEW WITH MR CHAN YEW WOOL

As the Principal of Jurongville Secondary School, what you do on a day-to-day basis?

I do lots of things but in short, I communicate with many groups of people in a variety of ways daily. For instance, I have meetings with teachers, discussions with HODs, conversations with parents, and exchanges with colleagues from MOE HQ. Before I speak, I always make it a point to think through what I want to communicate. Responding to emails is an increasingly important part of my work, so my daily schedule is very packed.





What is your general impression of the Jurongville students and teachers thus far?

I find that the teachers are very committed to their work. I often see teachers interacting with their students after school hours – counselling them or coaching them on their school work. I also see teachers engaging students in their respective CCAs because they believe that CCAs are a very important part of the school programme. As for the students, I think that they look very smart in their new Jurongville school uniform!

A memorable experience...

My most memorable experience so far would be the Fitness Run in Term 1. The event was a successful one and I was glad that many parents from the Parent Support Group (PSG) came down to support us despite it being a work day. They also helped to give away prizes at the end of the run. The strong rapport between the school and the PSG is very clear throughout the event.

Since the school started this year, there have been quite a few changes. For example, we have a new school logo and uniform. What other changes can we expect in the future?

First of all, after Speech Day, the newly-renovated library will be opened. The new library features a Heritage Gallery which showcases the history of both schools, Hong Kah and Jurongville. It is appropriately named "Our Story". Secondly, the school field with an artificial pitch will be completed in Semester 2. The pitch can be used for PE lessons and CCA training sessions. Progressively, the physical environment of our school will be further improved to make it more conducive for all students and staff.

If a genie can grant you three wishes for the school, what would they be?

Firstly, I would wish for everyone to be in good health. With good health, we can strive towards what we aspire. Secondly, I hope everyone will remain positive despite the challenges that we face as life is full of ups and downs. We ought to remain optimistic; with consistent effort, all challenges can be overcome. Thirdly, I hope that we will continue to work and learn harmoniously together, as we have done so far.

What led you to join the teaching career? Have you always wanted to be an eductor?









From 11 to 15 February, JVS commemorated Total Defence Day. We were reminded that each and every one of us had a part to play in keeping Singapore safe.



On 12 April, students from Jurongville Secondary descended on Jalan Besar Stadium, the home of Singapore football, for the finals of the National School Games Football 'B' Division Championship. Members of our sports CCAs, as well as performers from Drumatix Batucada, gathered in anticipation of an electrifying and adrenaline-fueled final that would put spectators on the edges of their seats.

Our 'B' Division boys had remained undefeated throughout their run in the National School Games. However, it had not been an easy journey. The previous games, especially in the semi-finals, had been hard-won, with injuries afflicting many players. Nevertheless, our boys blazed through all obstacles in their path, defeating last year's runners-up Meridian Secondary 5-4 in the quarter-final, and then prevailing over defending champions Singapore Sports School in the semi-final.

Before the match, professional footballers sent in messages of support, cheering on our boys. Among others, Singapore football legend Fandi Ahmad encouraged them to "play with pride, and play with passion" while Geylang International FC defenders Yuki Ichikawa and Anders Aplin wished them all the best for the most crucial match of the season.

United As One

The game kicked off at 3.30pm in front of a roaring crowd of spectators from both schools. Fiercely contested from the start, the first half saw both teams aggressively vying for possession. While Saint Patrick's School (SPS) clinched an early lead just nine minutes in, we were just as quick to equalise with an elegant run from Muhd Arsyad (3N4) who bypassed the SPS defenders to score our first goal of the game.

Our boys began the second half refreshed and ready. Eventually, in the 56th minute, our football captain, Nur Fazli (4N2), scored the second goal, putting us ahead on the scoreboard at 2-1.

SPS counter-attacked furiously in an attempt to equalise, which resulted in several SPS players receiving yellow cards for a series of rough tackles. Their efforts were eventually rewarded with a header between the JVSS goalposts in the 74th minute.

Tied 2-2 at full time, the game could not have gotten any more intense. With the clock inching forward into injury time, the pressure was evident for both supporters and players as both teams tried and failed to find the winning goal. Finally, with just a few minutes remaining on the clock, a deflected shot on target from Mohd Ryan Nifail (4NA) rebounded off the crossbar and was quickly pounced on by Muhd Arsyad, who then slammed it into the back of the net to win us the 'B' Division title.

Speaking at a pre-match interview, Mr Zaman, Head of Department of PE, mentioned how united the team has been, which no doubt played a part in their victory over SPS. Also mentioned was the rigorous training schedule the boys underwent, which entailed three training sessions a week as well as practice matches against numerous opponents, both locally and overseas in Kuala Lumpur.

When asked about the match, 'B' Division captain Nur Fazli emphasised the contributions of every member of the team towards the win. He particularly praised those who came onto the field as substitutes, saying that they "made a difference" towards the outcome of the match. He also expressed gratitude to the crowd of spectators from JVSS who had gathered to cheer the team on.

When A. S. Harendran took his O-level examinations for the second time, he was very focused. Having set his sights on taking up Aerospace Electronics at Singapore Polytechnic, he told himself that he must study hard and make it into the course; that he just had to do it. So he did. Harendran received an LIR4 score of 11 for English and four relevant subjects, including four distinctions, making him one of the school's top students.

Harendran shared that after his first attempt at the O-level examinations, Mr Ang Ghim Chee, his Additional Mathematics teacher, encouraged him to re-take the national examinations. With support from his teachers and his family, he became more disciplined by revising his work every day and persevering to the end.

Harendran, who was a National Police Cadet Corps staff sergeant in school, also won the coveted Best Unit Cadet in 2017 for his outstanding contribution to the unit. His advice to his juniors? "Don't enjoy (yourself) too much, (you need to) focus on your work too." Johnathan Yip counts himself lucky to have a supportive group of friends to study with and motivate one another throughout his secondary school life. The boys studied together in the library after school and played basketball regularly during recess.

Johnathan remembers with fondness how Mrs Heidi Lee, his Science teacher, patiently coached the class and was very encouraging. Her efforts made an impact on the entire class and Johnathan ended up scoring an A1 for Combined Science. He received an L1R4 score of 14 for English and four relevant subjects, including two distinctions, making him one of the top scorers in Class 5N1.

Now, Johnathan is studying Aeronautical Engineering at Singapore Polytechnic, an industry he has wanted to be a part of since young. His advice to his juniors? "Focus on the goals you have set. Don't listen to others (especially) when they say you can't do something."
